

Course Title: FMST 312: Parent-Child Relationships

Course Description:

This course will examine parent-child relationships from a multidisciplinary perspective. Emphasis is placed on the role of income, occupation, culture, family structure, family processes, and parent education.

Course content aims to answer the following questions:

1. How does income and occupational complexity affect parenting practices and child outcomes?
2. How does culture affect parenting goals, parenting practices, and child outcomes?
3. How does family structure affect child outcomes?
4. How do family processes affect child outcomes?
5. How do parent education programs differ?

Prerequisites: FMST/SOCI 200 or FMST 210 (preferably FMST 210)

Required Readings:

Course readings will consist of one published research study per class meeting. Although it is possible for you to obtain an electronic copy of the research studies from the UBC library yourself, I will email you the research studies (and questions) using the group email system that UBC provides instructors. In general, research studies discussed on Tuesdays will be emailed on the prior Thursday; research studies discussed on Thursdays will be emailed on the prior Saturday. This arrangement will provide you with five days to prepare answers to the study's questions, which will take you approximately 2-3 hours to complete.

Nature of Course Meetings:

- The first five minutes of class will provide you with an opportunity to review your answers to the assigned questions.
 - Next, you will complete the in-class activity independently. It is open book. It will typically consist of 3 questions. Paper will be provided. All missed in-class activities are considered un-excused and will receive zero.
 - Next, we will review answers to the in-class activity and the assigned questions. Student participation is expected. If you participate by answering one or more questions in class, then you need to sign the class participation sheet at the end of class. Remember that you are expected to make a total of three (3) whole-class contributions in the course.
 - Finally, the remainder of class time will consist of either a review of handouts, discussion of a video, and so forth. (Note: Handouts will be distributed in class. If you miss a class, email me and I can bring you missed handouts the following class. Please note that I will not provide you with missed lecture notes.)
