Course Assignments, Due Dates and Grading: The grading in this course is based on a written paper assignments, a midterm exam and a final exam.

Paper #1 : This is a short research paper on the question “What is the difference between scientific explanation and understanding?” The paper is a maximum of eight pages excluding references (single sided and double-spaced in 12 pitch font). References and citations should follow the format of the American Psychological Association guidelines. Due Date: OCT 11 in class. (25%)

Midterm Exam: The midterm exam is during class time (50 minutes) and will cover the reading material and lecture materials covered to this date. The format will be short answer and essay. Feb. 15th in class. (25%.)

Paper #2 : DUE NOV 18 IN CLASS. This is a brief five page report. Find an empirical research article in an academic journal (e.g., Journal of Social and Personal Relationships, Journal of Marriage and Family, Journal of Family Issues, Journal of Comparative Family Studies) and answer the following questions: (20%)

1. Title and Author (s)?
2. What theory or theories were used? Explain these briefly.
3. Where the theory(s) used to deduce hypotheses, interpret results or both. (explain)
4. Did the use of theory explain the data? (Explain how)
5. What alternative theories do you think should have been used or cited? (why?)
6. Did this paper contribute to our knowledge empirically and theoretically? (how?)
7. References

Final Exam: The final exam is cumulative and covers all readings and lecture material throughout the course. It is a **two-hour** exam in the December examination period arranged by the Registrar's Office. (30%)
